AN INTERVIEW WITH MARK MITTLER, MD

Schneider Children's Hospital's Co-Chief of Pediatric Neurosurgery and founding member of CMF's Physicians Advisory Council talks shop.

What new program at SCH has you most excited?

From my perspective, the most exciting program is our multidisciplinary Pediatric Brain and Spinal Cord Tumor Center.

In addition to the pediatric neurosurgeons, we have put together a team of pediatric neurologists, pediatric neuro-oncologists, pediatric intensivists, pediatric anesthesiologists, pediatric radiologists, pediatric endocrinologists, pediatric ophthalmologists, pediatric social workers, child life specialists... the list goes on and on.

I used the word "pediatric" quite a bit in that list to underscore a point. These are *pediatric* practitioners—fellowship trained and board certified. This type of commitment to children only exists in top children's hospitals. There is a relatively short list of institutions in the US with this type of expertise.

What impact will the Blumenfeld Center For Pediatric Medicine have on the level of care at SCH?

We need room to grow. Hospitalized children today are sicker today than ever before. Those with less threatening illnesses are often being cared for as outpatients. We need more space for much sicker kids and to meet the ever-increasing demand.

The SCH pediatric ICU, for example, operates at 100 percent capacity essentially every day. The Blumenfeld Center will dramatically increase the number of beds for the region's critically ill children. It will also allow children to enter a state-of-the-art pediatric emergency department and never be scared by seeing a sick adult.

What is the most pressing challenge SCH faces today?

Our biggest challenge is clearly financial. Without the generous support of donors, SCH simply would not exist. There is an increasing population of uninsured children as we face the recent economic downturn. In an effort to provide the best possible care for all children, the hospital needs money.

Vital resources like the Child Life Program, for example, are not paid for by insurers. Donations allow clowns to roam the halls. Donations provide tutors to keep sick kids up to date with their homework. Donations provide startup funds for novel research. Donations provide cutting edge transport equipment to bring gravely ill neonates to world-class care.

Where do you see SCH ten years from now?

In today's ever-changing environment, it is hard to answer where

anything will be in ten minutes from now, no less ten years. My hope is to see continued growth, novel preventative programs, greater community access and enhanced communication with primary pediatricians.

I expect that the next decade will see more and more community hospitals shutting their doors. Those remaining may simply lack the resources for anything more than basic pediatric care. Therefore an even larger burden will be placed on SCH to expand its tertiary care to the region's sick kids. ■



Pioneered by CMF in 1983—and replicated by other leading children’s hospitals throughout the country—this program continues to nurture children, and to hasten their recovery during their hospital stay, through dialogue, music, art, crafts, pet therapy, the Clown Care Unit, and specially-trained staff and volunteers within a uniquely-designed

child-friendly hospital environment. In June we held our 33rd Annual Golf & Tennis Charity Classic which raised \$500,000 thanks to the participation of our honoree Seth Kramer. Seth’s commitment to enhancing the quality of life of children is an inspiration to us all. Thank you to the Kramer family for their continued support of CMF.

In October Lester’s hosted “Groovin’: A Celebration of 60 Years of Fashion,” a kids’ fashion show that raised \$125,000. On December 4th, we participated in the groundbreaking for the Blumenfeld Center for Pediatric Medicine. We were joined by former Governor Mario Cuomo; Michael Dowling, North Shore-LIJ’s president and CEO; Philip Lanzkowsky, MD, former executive director and chief of staff of Schneider Children’s Hospital; Saul Katz, chairman of the North Shore-LIJ Health System; and former Schneider Children’s Hospital patients in turning the first shovel of dirt toward the construction of a \$130-million state-of-the-art center for pediatric medicine, featuring Long Island’s first dedicated pediatric emergency center.

Also in 2008, we selected Steven Humphrey to serve as CMF’s executive director. Steve brings a wealth of energy and hard-earned experience to both our operations and to our fundraising efforts.

Though we have accomplished much this past year, we are saddened to inform you that in late 2008 we learned that, along with more than 8,000 other entities, CMF suffered investment losses perpetrated by Bernard L. Madoff Investment Securities LLC. Though we are still ascertaining the extent of the losses, all designated and restricted donations remain secure at Signature Bank.

We are vigorously working with counsel and the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC) to reclaim assets that were stolen. All the while, we’ve continued to raise significant capital gifts and receive donor pledge payments.

Thirty-six years ago, CMF’s founders faced seemingly insurmountable obstacles in their dream to build the New York metropolitan area’s first children’s hospital. Yet, through their hard work and tenacity, they achieved their goal, benefitting the lives of millions of children and their families that have since sought care at the institution they founded.

Moving forward into 2009, we must develop capacity, depth and structure within our board of trustees and staff. We must improve our ability to raise funds by developing our relationships, by becoming more visible in the community, and by expanding and diversifying our membership.

We, too, will overcome our obstacles to achieve our hopes and dreams of helping critically ill children. With your commitment, your time, and your financial support, we will achieve our mission. We wish you and your family a healthy and happy New Year. ■

CMF breaks ground on Blumenfeld Center for Pediatric Medicine

Twenty five years after attending the opening of Schneider Children's Hospital, former New York Governor Mario M. Cuomo rejoined CMF and the North Shore-LIJ Health System on December 4th in breaking ground on a four-story, \$132 million pavilion to be named the Blumenfeld Center for Pediatric Medicine.

The new 100,000-square-foot building, to be erected in front of the existing 152-bed hospital and scheduled to be completed in 2011, will feature:

- The region's first dedicated pediatric emergency department;
- A pediatric imaging center;
- A 25-bed Pediatric Intensive Care Unit; and
- A 25-bed Medical-Surgical Unit.

When Governor Cuomo cut the ribbon on the new hospital during his first year in office in 1983, he said of SCH, "Children will be treated here, cured and made whole and given reason to believe that there is real goodness and real compassion in the world around them. The coming generations will build on our achievement, expand it and improve
